

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Some thoughts.....

A couple of weeks ago when on Skye for family birthdays Jen and I had an overnight on the island of Raasay. It's only a 20mn ferry ride from the mainland of Skye but has that lovely quiet island feel about it. It's about 15 miles from top to bottom and a couple of miles wide and I don't know how many live on the island but it's not busy – you can walk the roads without seeing a car and the footpaths without meeting a single soul. There is one hotel and one shop, a distillery which produces 'a lightly peated single malt' and is the first legal distillery on the island - although I would imagine there have been many enterprising crofters over the years who have had nice little less-legal earners going. We were there for not more than 24 hours and did a bit of driving up to the top of the island....until the road disappeared....and a bit of walking....and it's a road and a path that I want to write a wee bit about this week and next.

This week – the road. As I said we drove from near the south of the island (where the ferry comes in) as far north as we could go without needing a tracked vehicle. The road was single track and twisted up and down and round almost

impossible corners following the terrain. The last 1.75 miles of the road are known as 'Rathad Chaluim' - 'Calum's Road' for us non-Gaelic speakers. It's unremarkable until you hear that it was built by one man, Calum MacLeod, by hand whose only tools were a barrow and pick and shovel taking about 10 years. Until then there was no road serving the crofts where the majority of the islanders stayed at that time. It shows what singlemindedness can do. Sometimes being a Christian

BMS Prayer Guide 2023

BMS is starting to grow its Church and Community Mobilisation (CCM) work. In CCM, two things happen. Firstly, churches are encouraged to be more outward facing and see the positive role they can have in their communities. Secondly, churches are equipped to recognise the resources their communities already have, and to take ownership of the development they want to see.



SUNDAY 10

Thank God that through CCM, communities can recognise the resources they have and start using these to meet their needs. This has empowered people and given them a sense of ownership.

MONDAY 11

CCM helps people to see that poverty is not God's plan: there is potential within people to change their situations. Thank God that through the CCM Bible studies, people realise God has given us all gifts, talents and resources.

TUESDAY 12

Thank God for the 28 people in Nepal who are being trained to facilitate CCM. Praise God that CCM has enabled churches to build good relationships with community members and government officials. Churches have gained respect and recognition in their communities.

WEDNESDAY 13

Self-help groups are a key component of CCM. Thank God that through these groups people can save money and access loans, enabling them to start businesses and meet their needs.

THURSDAY 14

CCM uses Bible studies to help churches consider what it means to be "salt and light". Thank God that in Nepal this has led to Christians supporting the most vulnerable in the community.

FRIDAY 15

In Uganda, BMS partner JLH is planning to start CCM. Pray for them as they make their plans and identify facilitators to be trained.

SATURDAY 16

The widow in 2 Kings 4: 1-7 thought her situation was hopeless. But she learnt that a mere drop of oil could be used to overcome her challenges. Praise God that CCM gives communities hope.

Are you amazed by Jesus? – 4.

Those who heard and saw Jesus in action were amazed – amazed by what he did as we have looked at over the last 3 issues but also amazed by what he said. Does Jesus still amaze us by what he said? Does he still challenge us and the way we think about ourselves and the way we live by what he saidand says?

²² The people were amazed at his teaching, because he taught them as one who had authority, not as the teachers of the law.


Thoughts

The crowds who listened to Jesus were amazed, amazed at what he said – his teaching. But they were used to listening to folk expounding the scriptures so what was so different about Jesus? – 'he taught as one who had authority. (Cont. on page 5)

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But what was this authority? When the local rabbi or any visiting speaker spoke in the synagogue, they would normally take the scriptures and explain it to the people, they would cite previous experts and quote what they said but when Jesus spoke it was different. He didn't refer back



to other so-called experts – he spoke with his own authority. He didn't need anyone else to back up what he said about God's word. On several occasions Jesus uses the words 'I say to you'. I, with the authority I have, say to you.

Matthew 8:11 I say to you that many will come from the east and the west, and will take their places at the feast with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven.

Mark 5:41 He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha koum!" (which means, "Little girl, I say to you, get up!").

Mark 13:37 What I say to you, I say to everyone: 'Watch!' "

Luke **7:14** Then he went up and touched the coffin, and those carrying it stood still. He said, "Young man, *I say to you*, get up!"

Luke 11:9 "So *I say to you*: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you.

The authority Jesus had that was recognized by those who listened was his own. It did not depend on any else. **So, what was the source of this authority?** Well, we find that explained by Jesus himself in John 14.

John 14:10 Don't you believe that I am in the Father, and that the Father is in me? The words I say to you are not just my own. Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work.

So, the source of this authority which Jesus possessed was his Father, the one who sent him. No wonder the people were amazed at the authority with which he spoke – in John 7 when some temple guards had been sent to arrest Jesus they returned and told their bosses –

⁴⁵ Finally the temple guards went back to the chief priests and Pharisees, who asked them, Why didn't you bring him in?


⁴⁶ No-one ever spoke the way this man does, the guards declared.

⁴⁷ You mean he has deceived you also? the Pharisees retorted.

So, Jesus spoke with his own authority, authority that came from being who he was and who had sent him. And that leads to another question - **Do we recognize his authority?**

This is a very dangerous question to answer. If we say we don't recognize his authority, then we are turning our backs on the one God has sent into the world to make himself known to us. And if not Jesus' authority, then whose? My own? My partner's? Some famous philosopher's? The state's? Or no one's.

And if we do recognize the authority of Jesus this is equally dangerous because we then have to take the decision – do we submit to that authority and live our lives in the light of what Jesus taught. Or do we ignore it and go our own way. What's your answer?
