Well, last week I said we were hoping to worship at Hawkshead Hill Baptist Church on the Sunday and we did. We knew all the songs – old and modern – and we were led to consider Matthew 25 where Jesus talks about the time when the sheep will be separated from the goats. I learned something new – middle



BMS Prayer Guide 2023

The world is often a broken place. People living in poverty are also commonly facing exclusion, violence, lack of services, political turmoil and natural disasters. BMS aims to improve services and income in areas where neither the government nor economy functions well. In emerging economies, we work with churches to help them respond to poverty in their own locations.



SUNDAY 3

Pray for church communities in Nepal who are tackling poverty as part of their daily witness within the Sanga-Sangai project, run by BMS' local partners.

MONDAY 4

Lift up mission worker Genesis Acaye as he serves communities in northern Uganda through agroforestry projects aimed at sustainable livelihoods. Praise God for the many Ugandan believers who are taking seriously their commitment to their families and the planet.

TUESDAY 5

Pray for access to justice for the poorest communities, and praise God that BMS' legal partners in Uganda and Mozambique are working to make this possible. When conflict is navigated and land rights are established, local communities can develop their land to provide enough income for their households.

WEDNESDAY 6

Pray for the BMS team in Guinea as they work with poor communities to help them discover their God-given gifts, enabling them to thrive in a highly marginalised context.

THURSDAY 7

Pray for fragile countries such as Afghanistan, Chad and Guinea. Problems such as political instability and the exodus of refugees reverse development and heighten poverty.

FRIDAY 8

Lift up regional Baptist bodies and the Baptist Forum for Aid and Development as they respond to major humanitarian disasters. Pray especially for settlement and reconstruction efforts in Ukraine, Türkiye and Syria.

SATURDAY 9

Pray for BMS workers in Afghanistan seeking to improve agricultural livelihoods and access to safe water. Pray that they can share something of our gospel hope through their actions and sensitive conversations.

Recognizing Jesus

One of my favourite Christmas stories is about the old shoe cobbler who dreamed one Christmas Eve that Jesus would come to visit him the next day. The dream was so real that he was convinced it would come true.

So the next morning he got up and went out and cut green boughs and decorated his little cobbler shop and got all ready for Jesus to come and visit. He was so sure that Jesus was going to come that he just sat down and waited for Him. The hours passed and Jesus didn't come. But an old man came. He came inside for a moment to get warm out of the winter cold. As the cobbler talked with him he noticed the holes in the old



man's shoes, so he reached up on the shelf and got him a new pair of shoes. He made sure they fit and that his socks were dry and sent him on his way.

Still he waited. But Jesus didn't come. An old woman came. A woman who hadn't had a decent meal in two days. They sat and visited for a while, and then he prepared some food for her to eat. He gave her a nourishing meal and sent her on her way. Then he sat down again to wait for Jesus. But Jesus still didn't come.

Then he heard a little boy crying out in front of his shop. He went out and talked with the boy, and discovered that the boy had been separated from his parents and didn't know how to get home. So he put on his coat, took the boy by the hand and led him home.

When he came back to his little shoe shop it was almost dark and the streets were emptied of people. And then in a moment of despair he lifted his voice to heaven and said, "Oh Lord Jesus, why didn't you come?"

And then in a moment of silence he seemed to hear a voice saying, "Oh shoe cobbler, lift up your heart. I kept my word. Three times I knocked at your friendly door. Three times my shadow fell across your floor. I was the man with the bruised feet. I was the woman you gave to eat. I was the boy on the homeless street."

Jesus had come. The cobbler just didn't realize it.

A Thought from Charlie

"If you Love me, you will obey my commands" (John 14:15)

The husband walked through the door at 5:50 PM and noticed that his dinner was not on the table. After throwing his coat over a chair, he muttered to his wife, who was in the kitchen: "If you love me, you will have dinner ready at 6:00pm when I come home". Pressured by his intimidating tone of voice, she quickly rushed the casserole and half cooked vegetables to the table. She glanced at her watch, relieved to be serving dinner on time.

"If you love me, you will obey" can sound like a threat. When our motivation to obey becomes an oppressive pressure to do the right thing, to do what is expected of us as Christians, then it breeds serious problems.

Obedience that is only seen as rule keeping ruins the love relationship between us and the Lord. Why? Even though the rules may be biblically based, we will end up obeying them rather than God. Concern with the letter of the law will cause us to lose the spirit of love.

The Lord's words in John 14:15 are not a threat. His words are to be read as a promise. "If you love me, that is, if you make me the centre of your thoughts and do your most ordinary duties with an eye to my glory, then you can't help but obey, for it will be 'the genuine desire of your heart'.

When we view the Lord's call to obey as a promise, we wouldn't so much follow his rules as we will follow his voice.

"Now that you know these things, you will be blessed if you do them." (John 13:17). Our prayer should be "LORD, may I rush to obey you not so much because it is the right thing to do, but because I long to please you with all my heart".


Could you add a thank you to the newsletter please.
