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

What's in your hand?

In the second half of last year we announced that we would be running 'The Romans Course' on selected Sunday evenings for those interested. I must admit (lack of faith) I expected about 5 or 6 diehards and was pleasantly surprised when 16 came to the initial meeting. At the penultimate meeting last Sunday there were 14 of us — most having been there regularly and the 2 who were not had good reason (If getting married and moving away from the area and sickness count as good reasons). Over the 9 sessions there was an openness to share and discuss and maybe challenge our entrenched thinking.

One of the things which challenged me in last Sunday's session as we looked at living in community as Christians was the picture of the closed and open hand – the closed hand containing the essential things we believe as Christians and which are non-negotiable and we hold onto tight – and the things which are in the open hand and where freedom to accept or not, adopt or not, are matters of individual preference or conscience or culture and should not be a barrier between Christians. But what are our 'closed hand' beliefs? One writer has put it this way,,,

'On the whole, Baptists have much in common with other Christian denominations. They believe there is one God who exists in three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. They believe human beings are sinners in need of salvation; that the Father sent his Son, who is fully God and fully man, to die for sinners; and that by grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone they become the children of God. Baptists believe that the Holy Spirit is at work in the world today regenerating sinners and equipping believers. Finally, Baptists believe that God will, in his own time and in his own way, bring the world to an appropriate end; that he will judge the living and the dead; and all who are in Christ will worship him forever.' https://www.thegospelcoalition.org/essay/baptist-theology/

I, personally, would accept that as a statement of my 'closed hand' items, the things which would allow me to share fellowship with others who share these 'closed hand' beliefs. But there are specific 'open hand' things which, as a Baptist church we believe and they are found in the 'DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLE OF THE BAPTIST UNION OF SCOTLAND' and these are the basis of on which we operate as a Baptist church.

- that the Lord Jesus Christ our God and Saviour is the sole and absolute authority in all matters pertaining to faith and practice, as revealed in the Holy Scriptures, and that each church has liberty, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to interpret and administer His laws;
- that Christian baptism is the immersion in water into the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, of those who have professed repentance towards God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, who died for our sins according to the Scriptures, was buried and rose again the third day; and
- that it is the duty of every disciple to bear witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and to take part in the evangelisation of the world.

While not being 'closed hand' beliefs that would stop us from having fellowship with others they are the basis on which we operate as a church.

BMS Prayer Guide 2024

BMS World Mission has learnt through tragic experiences the difference between relief and recovery when disaster strikes. Relief is immediate support provided to minimise suffering and provide basic human needs. Recovery is focused on restoring quality of life and community services to pre-disaster levels. We do both, but not without your prayers.



SUNDAY 4

Two devastating earthquakes in north-west Afghanistan killed over 1,000 people and caused major destruction last October. A broken healthcare system could hardly bear the weight of the injured. Please pray as our partners shift from relief to recovery.

MONDAY 5

At the end of last summer, Bruce Clark joined BMS to take the lead on all our relief and recovery work. His first week featured the Nagorno-Karabakh refugee crisis, the Afghan earthquakes and Hamas' attack on Israel. Lift up Bruce as he navigates a relentless role. TUESDAY 6

Today marks a year since a 7.8-magnitude earthquake rocked south-east Türkiye (formerly Turkey), with aftershocks numbering in the thousands. Pray for the more than 1.5 million people left homeless and the continuing work of recovery.

WEDNESDAY 7

The BMS Disaster Recovery Fund is used to respond to emergencies and to help in both the prevention and aftermath of disasters. Pray for wisdom for those distributing the funds.

THURSDAY 8

BMS work looks forward. We give more grants to long-term recovery than immediate relief – for example, paying for trauma counselling, rebuilding businesses or replanting crops. Pray that God would guide all these decisions.

FRIDAY 9

Recovery and rebuilding after a war, drought or tsunami can take decades. Pray for those left behind after TV crews move on, especially in areas where disaster has recently hit.

SATURDAY 10

Pray for all those who have lost loved ones in such tragedies. May they know peace and comfort, and be able to grieve well.

A Thought from Charlie

'How to Survive Almost Anything 3.'

Over the past 2 weeks we've looked at the first 2 parts of the three sections of the 'Contents' page which lists three sections before you really get into the meat of the book.

- A note from the author
- Introduction
- How to use this book

This week we'll look at 'How to use this book'.

Now you might say 'that's obvious', that you read it. Well, if it was a novel, yes — reading it from beginning to end is the most sensible way But this isn't a novel, it's a guide to survival in our world as it is and as it might become. It's presented in 6 parts from Part One — The Survivors Mindset to Part Six — The Breakdown of Society. The author suggests we need to focus on parts One and Two before looking at the other chapters. It makes

sense because the first two parts deal with 'The Survivor's Mindset' and 'Essentials'. If we want to be survivors then getting our mindset sorted and becoming familiar with the essentials is a good basis for dealing with the threats to survival which are covered in the following four parts.

Thinking about the Bible as the Christian's manual for dealing with the things life can throw at us...The Bible is not a novel in the normal sense although it does tell the story of our world and our place in it – so, while we can read it through from cover to cover (as we are presently doing if you follow the Bible Reading programme in the newsletter), that may not be the best approach on every occasion. 

PRAYER POINTS



Please pray for three villages in Cambodia: Tropeangrun, Vehpous and Sveysaw. In these villages an evangelism programme has started. In two villages, Sveysaw and Vehpous, churches have been established with a membership of 20 and 50 people respectively.

Praise God for those who are responding to be trained as disciple makers. Pray that we would be able to train 5,000 disciple makers spread across BMS World Mission partners Many women are becoming disciples of Christ in North Africa. We pray for BMS partner BigLife to identify four women to be sent to mentor and disciple women there coming to faith in Christ.

Pray for Israel and the Occupied Palestinian Territories. Pray for the Church and the ongoing conflict causing a high number of casualties and fatalities every day. Pray for peace in every part of the country and for the growth and progress of spiritual service.

Pray for the village of Amdir, in Mauritania, which has been suffering from a water shortage due to their well collapsing. Pray that a new well can be built and that the inhabitants of the village will gain access to a source of water.



Pray for forcibly displaced people who get stuck in refugee camps and similar settings, sometimes for years or decades. Lift up those in your life – including yourself if appropriate – who feel stuck in their journey of faith.

Pray that forcibly displaced people will receive physical, spiritual, emotional and social care to sustain them on their journey. Pray that we too may receive and give this care (Matthew 6: 11).



Astha Shrestha works with Human Development and Community Services, BMS' partner in Nepal. Pray for Astha as she promotes maternal and child health, encourages educational attainment for girls, and implements empowerment projects for women and girls.

Celebrate individuals with special needs who add value to our communities, remembering their intrinsic worth. Pray for the centre for children with learning differences run by the Lebanese Society for Education and Social Development, now known as Thimar.



Pray for additional funding to scale up the agroforestry activities in Uganda with over 100 households. We wish to expand the tree growing with more households so that restoration takes place after damage done through tree cutting for charcoal.

Thank God for creating us and giving us authority over creation. We're convinced that environmental issues represent one of the greatest opportunities to demonstrate the love of Christ to the world. Pray that God would help us to be good administrators of the resources of your creation, like the water that gives us life.
