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

Anyway, something caught my attention - Sara Davies - the craft lady from Dragon's Den was talking about her recent Comic Relief Arctic Trek She was talking about the challenges which she personally faced, admitting that she is probably several stone overweight, doing the challenge in the company of folk who were fitter and more equipped for what it involved. At times she was really down and struggling- 'the lows were really low but the highs were unbelievably high'. She said that this adventure had proved to her the truth of the saying 'To appreciate the mountains you've got to have been in the valleys.'

BMS Prayer Guide 2024

The UN has estimated that 30 per cent of widows and orphans in sub-Saharan Africa experience illegal property seizure. Traditionally, a woman is not married to an individual but to the family, so when the husband dies, she is still the property of that family. Widows who challenge cultural norms and complain to humanitarian organisations risk ostracism.



SUNDAY 3

Give thanks for BMS World Mission's partners, the Uganda Christian Lawyers' Fraternity (UCLF) and the Mozambican Association of Christian Lawyers (AMAC), as they empower women through their justice programmes.

MONDAY 4

Pray for Jolly Atimango, a BMS-supported worker serving with UCLF in Uganda. As part of her role, she raises legal awareness and protects the land rights of women, girls and the elderly in Acholi sub-region.

TUESDAY 5

According to the UN, 259 million fewer women have access to the internet than men, even though they account for nearly half the world's population. Pray for opportunities for BMS partners to facilitate access to technology for women and girls, including using computers, connecting to the internet and accessing smartphones. WEDNESDAY 6

Pray for BMS worker Jane Edwards as she supports AMAC in Mozambique. Pray too for courage for lawyers to influence policy makers to implement just and equitable land laws.

THURSDAY 7

Pray that upcoming gender training with BMS personnel and partners will result in increased commitment to gender equality. Pray also that the BMS partners will be able to access online training.

FRIDAY 8

Pray for God's wisdom and knowledge for the Gender Justice Co-ordinator as she works towards securing justice and equality and ending discrimination against women. SATURDAY 9

Praise God for male gender champions committed to advancing gender equality in the workplace. Pray that men and women will continue working together as allies and agents of change.

A Thought from Charlie

"Why are you downcast, Oh my soul? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise him, my Saviour and my God." (Psalm 42:5)

Have you ever started out your day feeling downhearted, a little blue? The Psalmist asks a good question: "Why are you down-cast Oh my soul?" Is it the weather? Is it to do with something you had for dinner? Is it the memory of someone you have lost who is near and dear to you? Is it an annoyance that that's been building, or just a vague, dullness of soul that can't be explained? Often there is no reason for being downhearted.

That's why the Psalmist quickly advises to put our hope in God and to do it by praising Him. Nothing lifts our spirits quicker or higher than to place our cares at the feet of the Lord Jesus Christ. Why don't you do that right now by saying from your heart, or, if you wish, singing it from your heart something like this old familiar song of praise.

Though Satan should buffet, though trials should come. Let this blest assurance control: That Christ has regarded my helpless estate, And has shed his own blood for my soul.

And, Lord, haste the day when my faith shall be sight. The clouds be rolled back as a scroll: The trump shall respond and the Lord will descend. Even so... It is well with my soul.

'How to Survive Almost Anything 8.'

Well, this week we look at Part 3 of 'The Survivor's Mindset' – 'Letting go of trauma.' In the writer's case the trauma from his own life was, as a child, being attacked and nearly killed by a mother chimpanzee defending her baby from what she thought was a threat.


All of us have experienced trauma at some time in our lives – some trauma greater than others – which have left us with scars visible or invisible. When we experience trauma it affects how we behave in the future. There is a tendency in all of us to want to be safe and previous trauma affects how we behave. If we've had an electric shock when trying to fix a plug we'll be much more careful the next time we're in a similar situation.

The instinct for survival is powerful but there is also in us a need for adventure – what else could explain the need some folk have to jump out of a perfectly good, safe aeroplane with a square of material attached to their back, or dive from a high bridge with the only thing saving them from certain death being a mega rubber band? Trauma tends to reinforce the survival instinct. Here's how the writer puts it – 'We are more naturally driven to survive at a basic, safe and modest level, and that's why so many of us are happy to rub along in 'comfort zones' that offer no real comfort, no growth whatsoever.'

We can take these thoughts and easily apply them to our lives as Christians and as churches. There is a tendency in all of us as individuals and as churches to operate in safe, survival mode, comfort zones that offer no real comfort, no growth whatsoever. But is that what being a Christian is all about? The early church did not operate in safe, survival mode, - they were in full adventure mode. Paul could have opted for a quiet life of enjoying his new-found Christian faith but he was driven into adventure mode by the need to share what he had experienced with others – despite the trauma he had experienced (see below).

Are we operating in survival mode? Is this church happy operating in survival mode – safe and comfortable in what we are used to or are we prepared to be adventurous knowing we are not relying on a square of material or a rubber band to keep us safe. Let the trauma go!

..... I have worked much harder, been in prison more frequently, been flogged more severely, and been exposed to death again and again. ²⁴ Five times I received from the Jews the forty lashes minus one. ²⁵ Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was pelted with stones, three times I was shipwrecked, I spent a night and a day in the open sea, ²⁶ I have been constantly on the move. I have been in danger from rivers, in danger from bandits, in danger from my fellow Jews, in danger from Gentiles; in danger in the city, in danger in the country, in danger at sea; and in danger from false believers. ²⁷ I have laboured and toiled and have often gone without sleep; I have known hunger and thirst and have often gone without food; I have been cold and naked..
